John Murray, MD Award for Excellence in Internal Medicine Monica Gandhi, MD, MPH HIV. Infectious Diseases & Global Medicine

This award is presented to a Medicine faculty member in recognition of academic excellence and dedication to the humanitarian mission of ZSFG.

her expertise with her patients and trainees. She plays an instrumental role in directing the ZSFG HIV Clinic (Ward 86). Despite extensive responsibilities, Monica offers constant attention and leadership, keeping the clinic vitally important and up to date with ever-changing modalities for care and prevention. Monica's leadership of Ward 86 remains an international model for high quality HIV care. She created a new program with the advent of the COVID-19 pandemic, with rapid development of novel programs for patient care and research, directly benefitting ZSFG patients as the pandemic evolved, and likely contributing to San Francisco faring better than most regions during the pandemic. Monica excels as a spokesperson to the public regarding COVID-19. During the crazy days of the pandemic Monica offered a reasoned voice of expert counsel for the public via many news media outlets. Beyond the humanitarian mission of ZSFG, it is noteworthy that Monica is a leading international researcher on HIV medicine, with outstanding funding and productivity, and that she leads the UCSF Center for AIDS Research (CFAR), a major program for research and training on HIV medicine. These last activities extend beyond ZSFG but help to identify our campus as a leader for HIV research within UCSF and nationally. She was and is the voice of sanity and sensitivity about the COVID pandemic for our hospital, the city, and the nation."

Care Experience Award Christy Soran, MD, MPH

General Internal Medicine

This award is given to a faculty member at the Assistant Professor level and recognizes dedication to the care experience, respect for patients, and shared decision-making to meet patients' needs.

"Dr. Soran is leading the renowned Office-Based Buprenorphine Induction Clinic (OBIC), which does buprenorphine inductions for patients with opioid use disorder. Under her leadership, OBIC

has created novel care opportunities for patients, including home-delivery of buprenorphine for patients living in SROs. Through her compassionate, patient-centered, programmatic, and community-building approach, she

has and continues to create new ways of tackling the opiate epidemic and inspiring and teaching us to deliver sensitive care to patients with substance use histories."

Clinical Innovator Award

Sithu Win, MD, MPH Cardiology

This award is presented to a person who has developed and implemented an innovative tool, process, or pathway for care that has had an impact on operations, efficiency or documentation.

"Dr. Sithu Win displays inexhaustible energy for process and product improvement, but he spends no time on self-promotion. As a result, many of us may not fully understand how Sithu Win's work elevates performance of healthcare teams across services and disciplines. Sithu overhauled antiquated workflows for ECG acquisition and analysis so that each tracing is reported quickly. Cardiac stress imaging that patients often hesitated to pursue at UCSF Health is now available on our campus because of Dr. Win's initiatives. Similarly,

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many more patients with valve disease and heart rhythm disorders are now rapidly scheduled for transesophageal echocardiograms and DC cardioversions because of the block time that Sithu negotiated with the Anesthesia Service. Sithu is con-



sistently innovating ways to improve access to non-invasive cardiology diagnostic services, despite that service suffering from suboptimal staffing and limited ancillary resources. Over the years, he has streamlined the in-

patient echocardiogram service, improved access to ambulatory ECG monitoring and is in the process of creating capacity for limited echocardiograms in cardiology clinic to reduce wait times."

ZSFG Department of Medicine Distinction in Medical Education Award

Joan Addington-White, MD General Internal Medicine

This award recognizes a faculty member who has advanced medical education at ZSFG through exceptional leadership, curricular innovation, and mentorship of trainees.

"Dr. Addington-White, SFPC Program Director, is at the forefront of training the primary care and general internal medicine leaders of tomorrow. She has successfully trained and mentored hundreds of residents and medical students and cared for thousands of patients during her time as a practicing physician. She draws on her deep experience and extensive clinical knowledge to model outstanding, patient-centered, and evidence-based care. She is an educator to all she interacts with in the humblest of ways and is generous with her time and delights in the practice of medicine. Dr. Addington-White's joy in clinical care and teaching is shown daily. She is frequently heard sharing an exciting case with colleagues and trainees and will eagerly provide updates on the outcome for that patient. She exemplifies a growth mindset and is constantly updating her knowledge and sharing what she learns through reading, evaluation of new evidence and attendance of and teaching in

ZSFG Performance/Quality Improvement Award Bethlehem Churnet, MD Hospital Medicine

This award recognizes the exemplary commitment to improve areas of performance at ZSFG, including quality, efficiency, and access.

"Dr. Churnet has restarted our patient safety review in our division and leads quarterly sessions focused on reviewing cases and improving processes. Dr. Churnet brings a balanced, thoughtful, and highly principled approach to review of adverse patient events. She approaches every situation with an open mind, gathers data and perspectives conscientiously, analyzes the situ-

Outstanding Early Career Investigator Award

Michael Peluso, MD, MHS, MPhil HIV, Infectious Diseases, and Global Medicine

This award recognizes a research faculty member at assistant professor level for demonstrating exceptional research productivity.

"Dr. Peluso's research focus has been the pathogenesis of HIV infection, mechanisms of HIV persistence, and elimination of HIV reservoirs; these are vital aspects of a high priority research agenda to bring about HIV cure. Michael co-directs clinical trials and related studies to disrupt the HIV reservoir and induce infection remission. With the pandemic, Michael took on a major interest in the pathogenesis of long COVID-19. In this regard

he manages a large observational study following people after episodes of COVID-19, with the goal of understanding the long-term biological and immunological consequences of infection. His

This award recognizes a DOM clinical fellow who who strongly embodies the mission to provide high quality and compassionate care to vulnerable and underserved patients and a dedication to the eradication of disparities in health and healthcare.

"Dr. Lee is an absolute gem of a physician and consultant who is beloved for many reasons - his infectious smile, his amiable manner, and his calming approachability - but this year he has really established himself as a local expert for questions related to substance use. He does a very thorough job that is patient-centered in approaching those with substance use disorders. He has taught several didactics including The Approach to Amphetamine use disorders to the SFPC residents, among the highest rated talks of the year. He also has generated data on patients at RFPC who are declined joint replacements and worked tirelessly on a more systematic and evidence-based approach to caring for these patients. He is con-

stantly teaching, not only about dosing of opiate replacement medications and the fine points of treating withdrawal, but also with the way he approaches patients, the tidbits of history his approach reveals, and his ability to cut through to recog-
