These awards are an opportunity to express gratitude for faculty commitment to the hospital and department's goals. Peers, through comments, provided nominations.

John Murray, MD Award for Excellence in Internal Medicine

Neeta Thakur, MD

Plumonary, Critical Care, Allergy and Sleep Medicine

This award is presented to a Medicine faculty member in recognition of academic excellence and dedication to the humanitarian mission of ZSFG.

Dr. Neeta Thakur is a dedicated physician-scientist committed to improving the health of underserved communities. She leads a diverse research group studying the impact of social and environmental stressors on lung disease in

marginalized populations. Her work has identified factors such as poor neighborhood health and historical redlining as predictors of increased asthma exacerbations, independent of pollution. Dr. Thakur has significantly contributed to shaping clinical care guidelines and policies, including serving on national taskforces and chair-

ing the American Thoracic Society's Health Equality and Diversity Committee. She also contributed to race-neutral reference ranges for pulmonary function tests, reducing historic biases.

In her clinical role, Dr. Thakur serves underserved communities in the ZSFG MICU and the Chest Clinic, the only Pulmonary Clinic in the DPH. She coordinates care to ensure excellent multidisciplinary, patient-centered care and is currently conducting a clinical trial on a hybrid care delivery method for Pulmonary Rehabilitation. This trial aims to expand access to Pulmonary Rehab for populations facing travel barriers and reduce delivery costs, benefiting many patients insured by programs like SFHP. Dr. Thakur exemplifies the mission of ZSFG through her unwavering commitment and innovative work.

Care Experience Award Jaya Mallidi, MD

Jaya Mallidi, MD Cardiology

This award is given to a faculty member at the Assistant Professor level and recognizes dedication to the care experience, respect for patients, and shared decision-making to meet patients' needs.

Dr. Jaya Mallidi exemplifies the qualities of a clinician-leader and serves as a role model to residents and fellows alike. Her passion for teaching, attention to detail, and superlative

clinical care are unmatched. Dr. Mallidi has gone above and beyond by coming in overnight to manage multiple critically ill patients and tirelessly advocating for patient transfers to higher levels of care when needed. She works closely with patients to achieve a shared understanding of their health problems, demonstrating both exceptional clinical skill and deep empathy. Her kindness, dedication, and service-oriented approach make her a deserving recipient of the Care Experience Award.

Clinical Innovator Award Elizabeth Imbert, MD HIV, ID, and Global Medicine

This award is presented to a person who has developed and implemented an innovative tool, process, or pathway for care that has had an impact on operations, efficiency or documentation.

Dr. Elizabeth "Liz"
Imbert has pioneered the POP-UP low-barrier clinic at Ward 86, specifically catering to individuals with HIV who are experiencing homelessness and face challenges in accessing traditional primary

care. Since 2019, Dr. Imbert has led this program, expanding it from a small pilot project to a large clinic that serves some of the most complex and socially vulnerable patients. Her efforts have been instrumental in securing funding and establishing a robust multidisciplinary team, ensuring comprehensive support services for POP-UP patients. Under her guidance, HIV viral suppression rates have improved dramatically, from 0% at enrollment to nearly 80% across the cohort. Dr. Imbert's innovative approach has had a profound impact, not only at Ward 86 but also through her support of other safety net HIV clinics in implementing similar models. She provides direct technical support and leads workshops at national and international meetings to share her successful strategies. Beyond her leadership in POP-UP, Dr. Imbert is an outstanding clinician and colleague, making her truly deserving of the Clinical Innovator Award.

ZSFG Department of Medicine Distinction in Medical Education Award

Alex Logan, MD Hospital Medicine

This award recognizes a faculty member who has advanced medical education at ZSFG through exceptional leadership, curricular innovation, and mentorship of trainees.

Dr. Alex Logan is a phenomenal educator, consistently demonstrating a deep commitment to supporting the education of learners at ZSFG. On the wards and during formal didactics, Alex displays outstanding teaching skills, infusing

energy and engagement into his sessions. He excels at distilling difficult concepts into easy-to-understand learning points and provides frequent, insightful teaching moments on rounds and through afternoon chalk talks. Additionally, Alex conducts innovative POCUS sessions for third-year medical students, capturing their attention with thoughtful questions and hands-on scanning opportunities. Learners consistently rave about his teaching abilities and leave his sessions energized about clinical medicine.

Alex's dedication extends beyond teaching; he is deeply invested in the professional growth of individual learners. He proactively provides constructive feedback and regularly checks in on their progress. His enthusiasm for bedside learning is infectious, and his novel approaches, such as daily WhatsApp quiz questions and harm reduction sessions, help teams grow and learn effectively. Residents frequently express how fortunate they feel to work with Alex, reflecting on the fun and growth they experienced alongside him. His passion for education, tremendous teaching skills, and profound impact on learners make him highly deserving of the Distinction in Medical Education Award.

Henry F. Chambers, MD Medicine Subspecialty Consultant Award Sarah Kim, MD Endocrinology

This award recognizes an outstanding subspecialty faculty member who exemplifies the contributions of longtime Infectious Disease specialist Henry (Chip) Chambers.

Dr. Sarah Kim is an invaluable resource at ZSFG, renowned for her extensive knowledge and experience in diabetes and weight management. As the director of the Diabetes and Weight Management Clinics, she addresses the high needs of our patients with compassion and expertise. Dr. Kim is approachable and generous in sharing her insights on challenging cases, making her a go-to consultant for both faculty and clinicians. Her ability to provide clear, actionable recommendations is highly valued.

Dr. Kim's exceptional skills in internal medicine, pediatrics, endocrinology, and diabetes care have empowered her colleagues in managing complex comorbidities like heart failure, kidney disease, and stroke. She has pioneered innova-

tive nutrition programs and the ZSFG Weight Management Clinic, emphasizing physical activity, stress reduction, and healthy food choices. Her leadership in using advanced treatments, such as GLP-1 agonists, has been instrumental.

Dr. Kim's dedication extends beyond patient care; she is always available to support her colleagues and patients, offering her expertise on perplexing diabetes management scenarios. ZSFG Performance/Quality Improvement Award

Lucas Zier, MD Cardiology

This award recognizes the exemplary commitment to improve areas of performance at ZSFG, including quality, efficiency, and access.

Dr. Lucas "Luke" Zier embodies quality improvement through his innovative efforts to standardize inpatient heart failure care. His work on the care path in Epic serves as a model for chronic care delivery, not only across the San

Francisco Health Network (SFHN) but also nationwide. As a co-founder of the PROSPECT lab (Pioneering Research and Organization Solutions to Provide Equitable Care through Technology), Dr. Zier leads numerous initiatives to enhance care delivery.

Together with Jonathan Davis, Dr. Zier has employed lean and improvement skills to implement heart failure and troponin pathways in Epic. This work has elevated the standards of inpatient heart failure and interventional care, significantly contributing to reducing heart failure readmissions among Black African Americans. Additionally, Dr. Zier's expertise in AI and improvement work has been shared in multiple venues, showcasing his commitment to advancing equitable healthcare. Dr. Zier's dedication and impact make him a highly deserving recipient of the Performance/Quality Improvement Award.

Outstanding Early Career Investigator Award Matt Durstenfeld, MD

Matt Durstenfeld, MD Cardiology

This award recognizes a research faculty member at assistant professor level for demonstrating exceptional research productivity.

Dr. Matt Durstenfeld has made substantial scientific contributions and demonstrated prolific productivity as a junior faculty member at ZSFG.

His primary research focuses on the cardiovascu lar consequences of infectious diseases, including COVID-19 and HIV, establishing him as a national thought leader in this field. He led the Cardiovascular Impact Study, using advanced cardiovascular assessments to study cardiac function in post-COVID patients, and a multi-institution team examining COVID-19 infection among people with and without HIV. In just three years, Matt has published 50 manuscripts, with 11 as first-author.

Currently, Matt co-leads CPET measurements for several significant studies, including the OUTSMART study on monoclonal antibodies for Long COVID, the RECOVER-VITAL study of Paxlovid, and the NIH-funded

REVERSE-LC trial of baricitinib for Long COVID. He also leads a pilot study on cardiac rehabilitation for chronotropic incompetence in Long COVID and recently received a K23 from the NHLBI for research on cardiorespiratory fitness among people with HIV. Matt has secured independent funding from multiple sources, including the Center for AIDS Research and internal grants for various projects.

Beyond his research, Matt has been an exceptional mentor to many residents and cardiology fellows, guiding projects on disparities in heart failure and cardiovascular risk among vulnerable populations. His mentorship includes residents and fellows working on diverse topics, such as socioeconomic disparities, substance use, and sex differences in cardiovascular risk prediction. Matt's remarkable achievements and dedication to advancing our understanding of cardiovascular health make him highly deserving of the Outstanding Junior Investigator Award.

John Landefeld, MD Rheumatology
